

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Enhancing the Access of Students with Disabilities to Information at the Library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta Indonesia

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Abstract

The States of Islamic Studies (UIN) Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta is one of inclusive universities in Indonesia. UIN Sunan Kalijaga has been declared as inclusive university since 2006. UIN Sunan Kalijaga has several disabled students. The number of disabled students has been significantly increased year by year. Consequently, UIN Sunan Kalijaga must provide the facilities to support teaching learning processes. As Information provider, the university library has to give accesses to disabled students relating collection, services and facilities. This paper describes the roles of library in serving students with disabilities at UIN Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta. Qualitative method has been employed. The data was gathered through interviews, observation and documentation. The article concludes that the library has been trying to give access to students with disabilities by providing Disabled friendly library building, disable corner and employing Ebooks for Blinds. But still, the library still need to develop those services regarding policies and facilities in order to give better services for them.

1. Introduction

Indonesia has deep concern on the implementation of education for all levels of society regardless their religions, sex, race and others. The government amandement stated explisitly that every citizen has right to get her/his education. The education in Indonesia covers all stages from basic education to higher education. Further, the government tries to accommodate the education for all covering human rights, religious, norms and pulrality values. This means that government guaranties that the education in Indonesia will also give attention to individual diversity as stated by UNESCO as Education for all. Difabel person also has special attention. In this case, the government provides special education. The regulation number 72 1991 supported by the regulation number 4 1997 instructed the government to give all citizen accesses at all aspects including education. Even the regulation number 20 2003 about National Education System stated clearly that Education for difable person is part of National Education System. As result, the awareness of the importance of inclusive education is being socialized around the country. The implementation of inclusive education needs supporting human resources, system and facilities including the libraries. In the libraries, the students with disabilities need services and collection that meet their situation. The library has crucial roles in supporting teaching –learning processes so that the library is one of the important requirements in building educational institution. In this case, UNESCO Manifesto stated that the libraries must serve their users regardless their genders, religions, races, social status and phisical condition.

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The States of Islamic Studies (UIN) Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta is one of inclusive universities in Indonesia. UIN Sunan Kalijaga has been declared as inclusive university since 2006. As an inclusive university, UIN Sunan Kalijaga has several disabled students. The number of disabled students has been significantly increased year by year. Consequently, UIN Sunan Kalijaga must provide the facilities to support teaching learning processes. As Information provider, the university library has to give accesses to disabled students relating collection, services and facilities. This paper describes the roles of library in serving difabel students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga.

2. Literature review

Research on information or library services for people disabilities has been conducted by several experts. In this paper, two of the researches will be described. The first research is done by Margareth E.S. Forrest who investigated the implementation of IFLA Checklist for students with disabilities in the academic libraries in the United States, namely: School of Nursing and Midwifery Library of University of Dundee Scotland. This research used Disability Legislation that was applied in Scotland in order to provide legal context for the research and used IFLA Checklist as research instruments. The two instruments then used to evaluate the constrains faced by the libraries in serving the students with disabilities in accessing information. The results of the research shows that physical access, media format (computer equipment) and services of the libraries was quite adequate. Overall, the libraries has shown the innovative way in supporting library to provide services for students with disabilities.

The second research done by Patric R. Spence et. al (Spence, 2007). This research investigated the differences between disabled and non-disabled person in using media focusing on how she/he was evacuated, how she/he handled crisis, the patterns of information seeking she/he had and the use of information media during Katarina Storm in the United States. This research used survey involving 554 victims of Katarina Storm who had major and minor disabilities located in different areas. This result of this reaseach showed that there was differences in evacuation planning, crisis handling in which disabled person had more urgent preparation but had less evacuation planning. There was also differences in the patterns of information seeking. But there is no difference among disabled and non disabled person in using information media.

3. Methods

This reasearch will try to answer the question on how the library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga give information and service to disabled students.

In collecting the data for this research, the researcher used semi-structured interview directed to the head of division information services and the head of difable corner as the main technique. While observation is used to support the data gained from the interview.

All the interview were conducted at the Library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga The observation was conducted after the interview with each participants. Based on data gathered from interviews and observation, the researchers analysed data and describe them using descriptive methods.

3.1 Type of research

This research is a qualitative research that will answer: How does the library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga give information and library service access to the students with disabilities.

3.2 Data collection

In collecting data, researchers used some following methods:

- Interview: this technique is the primary method used to find data relating to the history of Difable Corner development, the policies, services and facilities applied in giving services to the students with disabilities.
- Observation. This technique is used to support data gathered from interview by observing the condition of The difable corner and website provided for the blind students.
- Documentation. The technique used documentation own by the library and Center For Sudents with Disabilities such as: minutes of meeting and annual reports to see the policies relating to the services given to the students with disabilities.

3.3 Informan

The purposive sampling is used to choose the informans for this research. The informans were chosen based on some criterias, such as the informans's understanding concerning The difable corner. The informans are:

- The Head of Difable Corner of UIN Sunan Kalijaga's Library
- The Head of UIN Sunan Kalijaga's Library
- The Coordinator of Library Services of UIN Sunan Kalijaga's Library
- A difable Student

3.4 Research instruments

The instruments used in this reseach is a list of questions directed to the informan concerning to:

- The Foundation of Difable Corner Services.
- The Roles of The Library in supporting the University as an Inclusive Campus.
- The Roles of Difable Corners in Giving Services to The Students With Disabilities.
- The Policies and Library's commitments in developing Difable Corner.

4. Finding

4.1 The profile of UIN Sunan Kalijaga as an inclusive university

UIN Sunan Kalijaga became an inclusive Universitys soon after the name of the institution has been changed from The State Institute of Islamic Studies (IAIN) into The State University of Islamic Studies (UIN) Sunan Kalijaga in 2006. UIN Sunan Kalijaga has prepared a lot of things to provide services for disabled students by developing Study Center of Services For Disable Students (Pusat Studi Layanan Difabel – PSLD now becomes PLD). Relating to Difabel students, IAIN Sunan Kalijaga (now- UIN Sunan kalijaga) already had difabel students 5 year before PSLD founded. The following table provides information on the number of difables students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga. The table from PSLD shows that the number of disabled students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga has increased significantly.

The number of disabled students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga has became one of the reasons to provide facilities such as building design that meets difable needs including the library.

4.2 The role of library in serving students with disabilities

Profile of UIN Sunan Kalijaga library - disabled students' friendly library

Library is one of crucial fasilities for students in accessing the information especially for teaching learning processes. Disabled students are part of university society at UIN Sunan Kalijaga. Therefore the Library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga has provided information services that meets their needs. According to International Federation Library Association (IFLA)'s Checklist (Irvall, Birgita & Nielson, Gyda Skat, 2005), the library accessible for must meets the following standard: accessibility, physical condition, format media and communication services. Based on observation that we did in the end of 2012, some of the physical condition of UIN Sunan Kalijaga library has met the standard, such as:

• Has sufficient parking area that ease the student with disabilities in reaching the library; no barrier from parking area to the library building to reach the library and the distance from parking area to the library building is close enough.



• Accesibility to the gate of Library is quite comfortable equipped by the ramp landscape for users with wheelchairs users, large and wide gate, the floors with comfortable texture for wheelchair users, the floor with contrast colors and no barriers that blocked so that it is safe for users with low vision or vissually impaired, and difable signs in every floors.



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• Access to collection.

Accessibility of collections makes the users with wheelchairs easy to take the collection between the shelves.



• Self check out machine

The library has self check out for user to check books out independently. The design of this facility enable users with physically impairment to use independently because the machine is reachable from wheelchair.



Washroom

Generally, condition of the wash room has met the IFLA standard; the door handle is easily to reach for every students with disabilities even for the students with physically impaired, large washroom so that users can move their wheelchairs easily.



4.3 Information services for disabled students

As part of inclusive university, the library not only provides physical fasilities but provides information services for the students with disabilities as well. The library provides and digital books for blinds through e-book program production.

Difabel corner: Before UIN Library has library services for students with disabilities, these students were assisted and served by PLD. But the number of students with disabilities increase, PLD invited library to share responsibility in which PLD focus and the study and advocacy for general issues on disabilities and the library focus on services related to information access. PLD and the library then build Difabel Corner located in library as a part of library services. The corner is intended to all disabled students (deaf, Physical impairment and visual

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impairment). Based on observation, collections and facilities needed by disabled students are available at Difabel Corner, such as:

- Adaptive collections. The library has various adaptive collections include Braille books, 38 CD Talking Boooks, audio book(include academic and popular books) for example Metode Statistika Method of statistic). To help visually impairmed students, Difabel Corner also provide Egranary Digital Library, journal electronic databases donated by PLD in 2013 (based on interview with Isrowiyanti, The head of Difable Corner in November 16, 2014). Egranary consist of more than 50000 articles from various subject can be accessed offline on installed computer.
- Assistive technology. Difabel Corner provides tools to access digital collections namely 4 computers supported by JAWS to help users navigate menu and content of file. CD player is also available to help users to read talking books. And due to the lack of digital collections the library also provide scanner and open book software, optic character recognition (OCR) to convert printed materials into readable materials for visually impaired students. Using those devices, students have ease access to library collections. Ins this case, Furqon, one of students with disabilities (Blind) said that by using scanner that can convert texts into word formats and can be read using assistive computer, reading texts was much easier (interviews in November 16, 2014).





 Personal service. Personal service is provided to make sure the availability of accessible services for disabled students. According to Solihin Arianto, The head of UIN Sunan kalijaga's Library, library provides a librarian who serve disabled students assisted by

- volunteers. The volunteers help disabled students access library service and collections such as read books materials for blind students, make notetaking in class during learning session. Volunteers also help disabled students provide electronic books through scanning books and converted into readable format for blind students because the existing electronic books owned by the library are still very limited.
- Supporting activity. Difabel Corner also provides space to conduct supporting activities for disabled students to enrich their capacity as university students. According to Isrowiyanti, The Head of Difabel Corner (interview in November 15, 2014) the activities conducted by the corner include training for new students on how use facilities available in the library such as assistive computers. The purpose of the training is to equip new students with skill to access library service, facilities and collections. The students also learn how to scan books and change to be readable format.



 Training on sign language. Another important activity conducted by disabled students in corporation with Difabel Corner is Training sign language delivered by deaf students. This training is for librarians and volunteers in order to build their capacity in serving deaf students.



eBook for blind: As described above that electronic books are essential sources for visually impaired students as stated by one of disabled student, Akbar (interview on 15 November 2014).

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According to Akbar ease of use and more accessible are the reason why he (and most of blind students) prefer electronic resources to books in braille. This means that library should provide adequate amount of ebooks since most disabled students in UIN Sunan Kalijaga are visual impairment. Unfortunately as stated by Lisa D. Fisher, a Canadian volunteer worked for the Disabled Students Service, the number of accessible books for blind students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga library were very limited. Therefore, Lisa recommended to develop digital collections accessible for disabled students either on site or online through library website. The library gave positive response by developing *Books for Blind* through *E-Book Production* Project through digitizing printed books and then upload at library website.

4.4 Digitizing and policy


Digitizing process: According to the coordinator of library services (Ida Hadna, interview conducted in December 17, 2014) the library started Project E-book production in September 2013 involved 20 human resources. The first step taken by the library was preparing human resources who would work on digitizing printed books by giving training to volunteers, IT staff, librarians and disabled student. These people were then recruited as a team whose different role on digitizing process. The topic of training were:

- Introduction to digital collections
- File berformat: *.epub., *.pdf., html
- Introduction to *Abby FineReader*
- Daisy standard
- Practical steps on digitizing books using *Abby FineReader*: Scanning, Editing, saving books on Fine Reader format, Exporting ke File, *.pdf., *html., *epube-book into Audio book, Export e-book ke Audio book using Daisy xml translater
- Calibre management server access to web browser

The next step is digitizing books by the team who performed different task as follow:

- Book selection (3 visually impaired students)
- Scanning books (5 people)
- Editing file (7 librarians)
- Back up data (5 people)

The first step taken is selecting books. The selection process done by 3 blind students. The selection policy was based on textbook used by lecturers during learning process. This means there are thousand books of different disciplines need to be digitized. However, since the lack of time, the project only chose subject on institutional courses needed by all of UIN students. This was difficult decision they made since blind students coming from various study program want required books to be digitized to support learning process. The selected books were scanned, edited based on standad format and then uploaded on the library web. In this project, forty two titles were digitized: 1 book on language, 25 titles on philosophy, psychology and Islamic Studies, 1 title on Political science, 1 title on social sciences, 15 titles on education and 2 titles on history. The feature of *eBooks for Blind* can be seen on the figure below:



Policy on acces to eBooks for Blind: Digital collection on Ebooks for Blind gives easy access to users (either disabled or non disabled) and even are able to download these collections. And this may invite copy right issues since the library only has copyright to access printed version not electronic one. However, according to copy right regulation, the library can make reproduction materials as long as the reproduction are directed for academic purposes not for commercial reason. And to anticipate copy right issues, the library developed policy on the digital collection use. Basically, digital collections are available for all users. However, the policy limits the full text access only for blind students. The students have to register to Difabel Corner service to accept user name and pasword to access digital collections on eBook for Blind.

4.5 Constraint in developing service for students with disabilities

UIN Library has commitment to support UIN Sunan Kalijaga as an inclusive university through providing special services for students with disabilities. However, it is not easy to develop this service because it requires supporting facilities, budget and capable human resources. According to librarian whose responsible for Difabel Service (interviewed on November 12, 2014), there are obstacles to develop ideal service primarily related to collections because of the lack of human resources needed to digitize collections. The availability of volunteers in Difabel Corner is another problem. Most of them are senior students (year 4) so they are busy with assignment and research for their final project before they graduate. Therefore, the library needs to recruite new volunteers.

Regarding to collection format accesible for difable students, the library has limited number of collection and must provide more formats so that the difabled students can access them.

The table below shows the availability of collection that can be accessed by the disabled students.

Another problem is related to library facilities. The library does not have easy acces to library collection. The collections are placed in second to fourth floor but the building is not equipped with elevator. It means that users with physical disability will have difficulty to acces library collections. And this case, library should provide special service for these users through delivery service or provide volunteers.

4.6 Progress made

From year to year, the services at UIN Sunan Kalijaga's library for the students with disabilities have increased significantly. This can be seen from the progresses that been made since the difable corner was founded. At the time, the library had only one room with some collection and a computer with software for difable students. In 2012, there was one librarian with specific skill appointed to manage the difable corner. In 2013, there was a collection development program called "eBooks for Blinds" and, in 2014, the difable corner has been moved to a more spacious and accessible place. All this progress has perfected the services for difable, despite of its lack of accessible collection, which is more because of its lack of human resources. There is only one people in charge for the reproduction of readable-formatted books (an interview with Isrowiyanti, March 6, 2015). However, the library is now ready with its digital collection development programs, they are:

- Continuing the program of eBooks for Blind in cooperation with LIS Department UIN Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta in which students who take the subject of Multi Media and Media Technology are involved.
- Making cooperation with PLD in realizing the programs of 1000 Books for Disabled Students. The programs are to be executed by PLD and volunteers.
- Making cooperation with the University as parent institution and policy maker in developing the collection and services for disabled users. This cooperation enables the library manager to propose programs to the Planning Devision.

4.7 Lesson learned

Up to the present time, there has been only two inclusive universities in Indonesia, they are State Islamic University Sunan Kalijaga Yogyakarta and Brawijaya University Malang (an interview with Ro'fah, Former Head of PLD, March 7, 2015). There will be some other inclusive universities in the future. Yogyakarta State University, for example, will possibly turn inclusive as it accepts students with disabilities. In our opinion, as the number of disable students increases, the future libraries are to provide services for students with disabilities. As the Library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga shows, providing services for students with disabilities is long processes. The design of the building, for example has to be difable friendly (lift for disable students must be available). The biggest problem in Indonesia is that most of the libraries have not been designed as to make them accesible for disable person. Therefore, in developing library services for students with disabilities, the library should do the following activities:

- Making Cooperation with the relevant institutions. Cooperation with the relevant institutions is the key to develop services for the students with disabilities because the library needs a lot of things, such as sufficient funding, qualified human resources and specific knowledge and skills to deal with the disable students. As the library of UIN Sunan Kalijaga shows, Center of Services for Disable Students (PLD) has been of much help to provide the needed facilities and services such digital collection, assistive computers with JAWS and aconsultation.
- Policies and commitments from the parents institution. Up to now, there is no written policies concerning to the developing of the facilities for disable students at UIN Sunan Kalijaga as parents instution. As a result, the library cannot access optimally to the available resources, especially in terms of funding. This policy will make the suistainibility of the difable corner's programs possible, even if there is a shift in management.
- Library's creativity in developing Difable Corners. Since the library does not always have funding supports from the parents institution, the library's creativity is highly needed. Recently, there are a lot of technologies Therefore, the librarians must keep themselves updated with this technology issues and be able to make IT-based services accessible for the disable students that can be used to help disable students access information.

5. Conclusion

As a part of inclusive university, UIN Library has great concern on information needs of disabled students. Various effort are applied to meet those need through providing specific services namely Difabel Corner that is not only provide informations but also space, activities, facilities and human resources for disabled students. And considering that the most of students with disabilities are visual impairment students the library then develop accessible collections for disabled students in online digital collections. Eventhough the library has provided a lot of facilities for students with disabilities, the library still need to develop those services regarding policies and facilities in order to give better services for them.

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
